Ms. Segerdahl arrived in the United States by herself from Cuba when she was 12. Her parents sent her to Florida and a relative met her at the airport. Her parents arrived in Florida in the mid-1960s and the family then moved to California.

Ms. Segerdahl continued with the story of how her family figured out if she was on a fire or EMS call by the beeper or radio that was left at home. She didn't need to leave a note. They knew.

Ms. Segerdahl's contributions to the town of Weston have not gone unnoticed. She was named Weston Citizen of the Year in 2005.

"I love being an EMT. This country has done a lot for me and now I'm paying it forward!" Ms. Segerdahl said.
